For background, the number of homeless individuals in Arizona has been increasing since 2017. Most troubling, the number of unsheltered homeless, or those on the streets, has doubled, to 5,000 individuals a night. Three-quarters of the unsheltered homeless suffer from mental illness, three-quarters are addicted to drugs or alcohol, and the majority are both mentally ill and addicted. Homeless individuals can be found sleeping on streets, in parks, and in rights of way on city streets. Last year in Maricopa County alone, over 500 homeless individuals died on the streets.

## Cicero Action

Registered Voters in Arizona, Statewide. Voters were randomly selected from the voter registration file purchased from i360. Of the voters surveyed, $60 \%$ have voted in between two and four of the last four general elections, $13 \%$ have voted in one of the last four general elections, and $27 \%$ have voted in none of the last four general elections.

Frame:
The sample frame includes registered voters with landline and cell phone telephones. Voters without a valid landline or cellular telephone number were not contacted.

## Methodology:

Live survey; $60 \%$ landline telephone and $40 \%$ cellphone telephone.

Selected voters were contacted from April $12^{\text {th }}$ to $14^{\text {th }}, 2021$ using an all live survey presented in English.

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## Sample Design

Weighting

Contacted voters were selected randomly from a list of registered voters in the State of Arizona purchased by Data Orbital Consulting, LLC from i360. Individuals were randomly selected from the Voter File to mirror quotas for registered voters in Arizona. The interviewer asked for a specific member of the household but if that individual was not available, another registered voter in the household was accepted. CATI was utilized for this random sample survey.

The sample was weighted for gender, age, race, party affiliation, education attainment and geographic region to mirror registered voters in Arizona. Election data was sourced from i360 and the Arizona Secretary of State.
