Methodology and Transparency

Sponsor(s)

This survey was conducted by Data Orbital

Consulting, LLC and commissioned by the Arizona

Chamber of Commerce and Industry.

Target Population Registered Voters in Arizona, Statewide.

Sampling Frame & Methodology Frame:

The sample frame includes registered voters with

landline and cell phone telephones.

Methodology:

Live survey; 50% landline telephone and 50%

cellphone telephone.

Contacted voters were selected randomly from a list of registered voters in the State of Arizona purchased by Data Orbital Consulting, LLC from i360. Voters without a valid landline or cellular

telephone number were not contacted.

Selected voters were contacted from July 2 to 3, 2019 using an all Live survey presented in English.



Weighting The sample was weighted for gender, age, race

and party affiliation and geographic region to mirror the registered voter population. Election data was sourced from i360 and the Arizona Secretary

of State.
